CALL TO ORDER - Harry Matthews, President, called the meeting to order at 5:04 p.m. A quorum was present and the Board and audience introduced themselves.

### **CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES**

### TREASURER'S REPORT

M/S/C (Giroux-Greber/Plourde) Move that the Treasurer's Report for the period August 1 – 31, 2017 **UNANIMOUS** be approved as submitted.

### **ANNOUNCEMENTS:**

- Bob noted that the announcement for the position of NBRC Executive Director has been posted. Anh Nguyen appraised the Board regarding circulation throughout the state. A few applications have been received and Kinetic Flow is in the process of reviewing them.
- Kathleen Miller announced a Town Hall meeting relative to SDC closure which is scheduled for October 21, from 9:00 a.m. to Noon at Altamura Middle School on Arnold Drive. Nancy Bargeman, Director, DDS, will speak.
- Micheline announced the Friends of NBRC Annual Halloween fundraiser scheduled for October 21st at Dillon Beach. Money is used to fund services and supports for clients that is are not covered under Purchase of Service.

• Harry noted that NBRC has contracted with Kenetic Flow to head the recruitment of securing an Executive Director replacement. Harry provided a brief overview of the process for the final selection.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

- A. <u>Executive Committee</u> Harry Matthews, President; Angel Giroux-Greber, Vice President; Rita Edmonds-Norris, Secretary; Franklin Phillips, Treasurer No meeting.
- B. Vendor Advisory Committee Linda Plourde
  - The VAC met on Tuesday, September 12, 2017.
  - The vendor community is collaborating to bring nationally acclaimed speakers to our area for direct support professional training. The first of the trainings is scheduled for September 27, 2017. Diana Pastora Carson will present on her brother's journey from a state developmental center to community living. Fifteen agencies committed to paying \$200 to cover the costs of the training and to send employees. The training will be held at the Napa Elk's Lodge: two sessions 9 a.m. to noon and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Discussion followed.
  - The Repeal and Replace of the ACA is on the table once again, this time in the form of the Graham/Cassidy bill. The bipartisan effort that I mentioned in the September report did not gain traction and is no longer an option. Some Republican Senators are stating that they will not vote for the bill in its current form. Some states are offered more money as a way to get the Senators to vote in the affirmative, i.e. Murkowski for Alaska, Collins for Maine, Arizona for McCain. The push is to attempt the Repeal and Replace before the end of September as they only need 50 votes to pass it. After September 30, the GOP will need 60 votes to pass the healthcare bill.
  - The VAC is accepting applications for its vacant seat. The VAC intends to select a new member by the October meeting.
  - The feature presentation: Laurie Cameron presented on Person Centered Thinking.
  - Please refer to the minutes for further detail. The next VAC meeting is Tuesday, October 10, 2017.

It was proposed to the full Board that Elizabeth Clary, Executive Director, Alchemia, be seated as a Sonoma County representative on the Vendor Advisory Committee.

### **EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

Bob Hamilton, Executive Director

- Jonathan Padilla, Case Management Supervisor of SDC placement activities, shared the following:
  - ✓ Resource Development: DDS has committed a large amount of money to fund safe transition from SDC into the community.
  - ✓ October 2017, four homes will open; November two; December two; January eight; February five; March two; April one.
  - ✓ There have been unanticipated challenges with City Planning Commission, working with various neighbors, trying to maintain working partnerships etc.
  - ✓ Several families have relocated into NBRC's catchment area in order to be close to loved ones while maintaining their original regional center.
  - ✓ Ninety six (96) individuals will be transitioning out of SDC. There are two pending interregional center transfers; one from Central Valley Regional Center and one from Golden Gate Regional Center.
  - ✓ Transition Activities: There is a well-defined process that identifies four major milestones, i.e.,
    - > First meet and greet with provider, client, and family.

- > If there is a mutual agreement amongst the provider, client, and family then that is the second major milestone.
- > Coordinate with the SDC Regional Project and the larger Developmental Center team who will then assist in coordinating a transition meeting where the clients basic support needs will be determined to transition successfully into the community. Set a provisional placement date for the individual so there will be a timeline in place.
- > Conduct a Transition Review Meeting at a minimum of two weeks before the proposed movein date to assure everything outlined in the transition planning meeting is in place and everyone on the team is in agreement that all is being implemented.
- ✓ Approximately 96% of individuals transitioning into the community have completed a meet and greet with the provider, nearly 91% of those have stated the meeting was successful, 82% of individuals have completed a transition planning meeting, 34% completed a transition review meeting, and 25% of the individuals have made a successful transition into the community.
- ✓ Jonathan noted that DDS has been heavily involved in the details of the closure. He praised his staff for the hard-to-identify creative solutions for some very complex issues. SDC has gone out of their way to provide creative solutions as well. They have been proactive in identifying scenarios that may cause clients challenges and how the regional center will support that individual. DDS has partnered with stakeholders in the community to develop and provide additional oversite over and above annual IPPs etc. The entire process would not be successful without the partnership of SDC and community stakeholders.
- ✓ Harry commended Jonathan and his team for the amazing job they have done to provide successful transfers for over 100 residents to move safely into the community. Discussion followed.
- Bob Hamilton, Executive Director
  - ✓ An ARCA meeting is scheduled for October 19-20. Some of the statewide issues that will be discussed are as follows:
    - ➤ Equity is difficult to evenly apply relative to ethnicity or income level. Equity with children's services have improved however the adult population shows disparity. Some may be cultural and familial but to a great extent has to do with not knowing what services are available and not knowing how to advocate. A Children's Hospital in Los Angeles has been given a grant by DDS and ARCA to conduct a statewide study to determine data so there is a clearer picture for solutions. The Legislature is very interested that the Regional Center system make some progress in this area. NBRC will provide the Board with a report outlining areas needing improvement and what activities we are engaged in to make those improvements.
    - > Self-determination will become a reality through the Center for Medicaid & Medicare Services (CMS). When that happens, there will be a three-year trial period where only 2,500 people through-out the system will be chosen to participate. Approximately 200 people will be chosen from NBRC's catchment area. Some of the issues for NBRC include how to determine the annual budget, assessment of the client's needs, use of professional tools, etc. Historical funding of what services a client has required over the years will also be taken into account. NBRC will allow a family, client, to choose a fiscal intermediary to assure services remain within a determined budget. They can also choose to have their Service Coordinator provide that service.
    - > The Regional Center system is in the process of obtaining a new fiscal system. The company who received the grant to conduct a study is back at the drawing board trying to determine whether one can be purchased or one has to be customized. It is undetermined who will fund the new system. System failures are anything but easy to rectify. If we are unable to pay our vendors it does not bode well.
    - > The deadline for provider surveys has passed. All but three providers have completed the survey. Providers who did not complete the survey will have the increase in rates redacted. More rate reform is desperately needed to enable the Regional Center system to provide

consumers with needed services. We are awaiting the rate reform study from Secretary Dooley's office sometime in 2019. Discussion followed.

Michi Gates, Associate Executive Director, Client Services'

- The three remaining vendors who did not complete the online survey may have after all. Due to a glitch in the system, the results won't be known until a final report is received from DDS.
- October 2017 is the next to the last time NBRC will conduct a Board meeting at SDC. SDC is slated to close December 2018.
  - ✓ Michi noted that in 2005 she became the supervisor of the NBRC COAST unit and has been involved in SDC activities ever since. It has provided a full picture of our system, educated her, touched her heart, and deepened her commitment to what we do as a system. She has met and been mentored by many wonderful people. Aleana Carreon (SDC ED) and JJ Fernandez (SDC EA) exemplify the strong commitment and passion that goes into caring for the residents at SDC. It is wonderful to collaborate and work together as a strong team because we all have the same goals, i.e., to assure the safe and successful transition for SDC resident into the community. Michi acknowledged Elizabeth Clary as the SDC Liaison after Michi.
  - ✓ Michi thanked Jonathan Padilla for spontaneously offering to provide a Board presentation on the status of the SDC closure.
  - ✓ There have been delays but for the most part NBRC is on target to meet the goal for NBRC clients prior to or by Decembers 2018.
  - ✓ NBRC has successfully opened the second Enhanced Behavioral Support Home (EBSH) in the State of California. The home is currently excepting clients. The first crisis home in the State is slated to open in November.
  - ✓ The Santa Rosa Health Care Clinic is expected to serve clients and all residents from SDC by February 2018. Jonathan and Courtney meet with the board/clinic every month to assure we are on track for the transition.
  - ✓ SDC family meeting was conducted October 3rd regarding SDC closure. There was discussion around various housing and day programs that are being developed in the community for the residents leaving SDC. NBRC is still in the process of resolving chaplain services for residents moving into the community since attending a regular church service is not feasible. There were possible solutions offered by a parent.
- The Safety Net the Legislature approved from DDS will not meet all the needs of the SDC residents but it is a start. Hopefully we will be able to create resources out of that "start".
- Part of the reason NBRC did not get approval for additional EBSH and ARFPSHN homes is because Fairview and Porterville Developmental Center are also in the process of closing and are receiving the bulk of the funding to develop resources for those closures.
- NBRC staff will meet with Dr. Brad Baxtrom to provide feedback on what our needs are. Dr. Baxtrom formally ran the Northern Star Acute Crisis Clinic at SDC and is now at DDS to develop the Statewide Northern Star system with mobile crisis unit services. Three Northern Star homes have been developed in NBRC catchment area but will be a resource for everyone. Part of the Safety Net will be "step down" facilities for people with dual diagnosis who are in institutions for mental health disease and people who reside at Porterville Developmental Center for secure treatment. The Safety Net also includes intensive wrap around services for people with dual diagnoses and for residents leaving Porterville Developmental Center who are receiving secure treatment. These services will assist in maintaining people to safely remain in their placements. Michi expressed gratitude to Kathleen Miller for working with her and Sonoma County Mental Health to assist in developing a collaborative resource for those who need inpatient acute services. Kathleen offered to provide the Board with a presentation regarding developing a religious community for those who do not feel comfortable in a traditional church setting.
- Michi and Kathleen both serve on an Advisory Committee for the Department of General Services Site Analysis which is to determine what will be done with the SDC land once the facility closes. The

Department of General Services has provided their findings on the analysis of the land and have asked the Advisory Committee to provide input on what they would like to see done with the land. There will be another meeting in November and a public meeting in December.

- The Department is focusing on Regional Center clients who are conserved by DDS (NBRC has 19 clients; statewide a little over 500). They have assigned a person at the Department to review conserved clients to see if they actually need to be conserved. Michi asked Randy Kitch to provide a report in that regard.
- Michi provided an update on respite services at NBRC. There are concerns in the community regarding the way NBRC assesses and determines whether or not to provide a respite. NBRC received a letter from Disability Rights California stating their concerns and requested to meet regarding the procedure for respite and how we determine respite hours with respect to IHSS as a generic resource. NBRC Board member Angel Giroux-Greber is involved with this issue and uses respite. She is connected to her community where she has heard the same concerns. She has provided input, not only as a family member but as a Board member representing the community relative to this concern. Deanna Mobley, Associate Director of Children's Services met with Angel who provided input. NBRC has since updated the respite procedure based on community feedback. IHSS Protective Supervision has been used as a possible generic resource for respite. In some cases for minor children, IHSS requires the parent to provide the hours. As soon as NBRC became aware of that. NBRC incorporated that into the respite procedure. If a family member is required to provide the IHSS Protective Supervision hours then the family member isn't receiving a break. IHSS regulations are different for minors versus adults. It is NBRC's job to review each individual situation to determine an informed decision is being made on behalf of the client as well as follow the regulations. The 90hour per quarter respite cap is being eliminated January 1, 2018. Discussion followed.
- Competitive Integrative Employment is a partnership between DDS, Department of Education, and the Department of Rehab, to improve opportunities for employment for people with developmental disabilities. The implementation is an important part of the "blueprint". The implementation is conducted through local planning agreements (LPA). NBRC is begun the process by meeting with the Department of Rehab followed by engaging partners in Education in order to create an agreement. The goal is to assure that everyone who is interested understands the employment options so an informed decision can be made. NBRC will have a system in place to assist interested clients in achieving their goals.
- DDS has begun Self Determination trainings for the Regional Center system. Michi will be attending
  in Sacramento on Thursday, October 5<sup>th</sup> to learn more. There are several trainings scheduled for the
  community for those who might be interested.

### Dave Johnson - Chief Financial Officer

- Dave was unable to attend. Bob noted his report is in the Board packet.
- NBRC received the D1 allocation which is the predominant source of NBRC's Operating budget.
   NBRC had a growth rate the prior year so we received a 3-4% increase in funding.
- NBRC is expending more money in Purchase of Service.
- "NBRC is doing okay. All is well".

  - Competitive Integrated Employment (CIE) means working in an integrated setting with minimum
    wage or above with employee benefits and equal promotional opportunities. Regional Centers
    assist individuals with CIE by securing services and supports to maximize opportunities and
    choices for living, working, and recreating in the community. It means working together with selfadvocates to see if any changes need to be implemented

- Napa County Mayors 4<sup>th</sup> Annual networking breakfast is scheduled for October 12<sup>th</sup> from 8:30 10:00 a.m., Chardonnay Golf Club in Napa. The goals of this committee are to advocate to meet the needs and challenges that people with disabilities face in the county of Napa, elevate public awareness of the issues and to educate and encourage employers of the benefits of hiring people with disabilities in our county.
- Active Shooter Training is typically provided by local law enforcement. An active shooter is an
  individual actively engaged in killing or attempting to kill people in a confined and populated area,
  typically through the use of firearms.
- To stave off a lifetime of dental problems and make sure parents learn how to prevent children's tooth decay, babies should have their first exam when they get their first tooth, or no later than their first birthday according to guidelines from the American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry. Hoping to narrow the gap in care, the public health agencies of San Francisco and Alameda counties are launching pilot programs to train dentists to treat babies.
- California SCDD supports the following:
  - ✓ AB 1696 (Mendoza) Insurance for persons with developmental disabilities.
  - ✓ AB 1607 (Frazier) Integrated competitive employment.
  - ✓ SB 218 (Dodd) Qualified ABLE Program: tax-advantaged savings accounts.
  - ✓ AB 279 (Holden) Developmental disabilities; cost model would require the cost model to include changes in local minimum wage.
  - ✓ SB 283 (Wilk) Modify the definition of "developmental disability" to occur prior to the age of 22 rather than the age of 18.
  - ✓ State Council July "Access to Trainings and Outreach" reached 169,912 people.

## VAC – Residential Committee Meeting Minutes October 23, 2017

- 1. There was an active discussion about NBRC QA requiring things of residential not found in Title 17. An example includes telling homes they must attend training outside of their home for direct support professionals to meet their training requirements per Title 17, Section 56038. There were other examples. The committee would like to understand QA's criteria for going outside of Title 17, and NBRC's position on this practice. A presentation at a residential committee meeting may be helpful.
- 2. Discussion about the lack of residential resources available when a person has aged out of their home, is violet toward other residents, desires to live in a different home, the administrator wants to retire, or the resident is non-ambulatory and lives in a home licensed for people who are ambulatory. Homes are told there are no resources. The person must stay in the facility, regardless of inappropriateness or impact on others, which can put the home out of compliance with Title 22. This practice can go on for years. In one stated case, three years.

Even from the perspective of HCBS, it seems unlikely people will be allowed to remain where they violate other's rights through their aggression, or are unsafe because of their age or ambulatory status.

- 3. Through email, there was a discussion of the residential community getting together, such as a picnic or dinner.
- 4. There was a discussion about fewer opportunities being available to take the DSP challenge test. Also, that people show up for the class only to find their name is not on

the list, even though they signed up online. David Mauger will check into this and report back to the committee.

- 5. Discussion about what appears to be a quick turnover of service coordinators, and an expressed wish for improved communication between NBRC and the home when this happens.
- 6. There was talk about R&D is requesting copies of special incident reports. The concern is if this is a confidentiality issue. A second issue was the time that passes when a person moves into a home and gets up and running with transportation to their day program, with one example taking up to three months.
