<p><u>Individuals achieve self-reliance and independence</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NBRC featured individuals achieving self-reliance and independence through work and leisure activities (Special Olympics) at 2 NBRC All Staff Meetings; NBRC collaborated with the Sonoma County Mayor’s Committee to recognize 9 individuals at the Annual Best Practices Awards Breakfast Oct. 28th, 2015 • NBRC has purchased 267 Individual Housing Plans with North Bay Housing Coalition to support self-reliance and independence; NBRC publishes monthly roommate information and supported two gatherings for individuals to ‘mingle’ and get to know others looking for roommates • NBRC has expanded outreach and education to increase awareness and to promote equity which supports self-reliance and independence with 18 events and/or presentations to the community reaching over 1000 community stakeholders • NBRC Transportation Access Planning identifies cost effective services that promote greater independence and self-reliance with at least 600 individuals/families utilizing public transit • NBRC has supported 57 individuals in receiving driver training
<p><u>Individuals achieve economic influence through employment</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NBRC collaborates with Santa Rosa Junior College to support students in the College to Career program, with currently 68 NBRC clients participating; NBRC collaborates with Vallejo Unified School District to support students in Project Search with 8 NBRC clients participating in 2015 • NBRC has secured and coordinated a grant from the State Council over this past year to assist two work programs, Redwood Empire Industries and Products, Services and Industries transition to a customized employment model that supports community integration

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Four Customized Employment workshops were held in collaboration with WorkLink under the SCDD grant (over 60 participants and 10 clients in job development) and one Work First presentation was provided at NBRC Board of Directors meeting • NBRC provided 4 Dept. of Rehabilitation trainings to 39 Service Coordinators • NBRC distributes news and informational bulletins regarding employment legislation and opportunities through its weekly newsletter feed to 284 subscribers
<p><u>Individuals are the principal decision-makers in their lives</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NBRC Consumer Advocate held 11 group and 2 Regional meetings with self-advocates and Service Coordinators to promote independent decision-making, handling of own resources and money, making career decisions, and voting • 39 new NBRC Service Coordinators received training in National Voters Rights Act including promotion of voter registration • NBRC held 8 “Orientations to NBRC” to parents/ families to educate them on clients rights and core principles of the Lanterman Act • NBRC collaborated with Sonoma County Office of Education to provide social-sexual education to 42 Special Education students in transition age 18-22
<p><u>Family Support services result in health family environments</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NBRC continues advocating for use of community resources and private insurance, transitioning individuals with autism needing behavior supports to private insurance and providing co-pay and deductible supports as needed through the IPP process • At least 100 parents have been reported to have completed Parent Training in Behavior Management coursework; online Parent Training in Behavior Management coursework has recently been made available, including content in Spanish • Utilization of Creating Behavioral and Educational Momentum (CBEM) crisis intervention services resulted in 161 individuals/families receiving crisis intervention supports to support family’s needs

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NBRC refers families to Matrix (Solano and Sonoma) and ParentsCAN (Napa) Family Resource Centers at Intake for direct parent support groups, assistance with social security, IEPs, and additional workshops as these are scheduled; informational newsfeeds are sent out weekly with support information and events held at FRC's
<p><u>Individuals and families have access to community resources</u></p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • NBRC continues supporting, problem-solving, and facilitating use of private insurance and community resources to access behavior and medical services necessary to support client and family health, including use of co-pay legislation to support client access to needed medical services • NBRC contracted Dental Services Coordinator has resulted in 319 individuals accessing and receiving needed dental services, and 167 receiving medication management support and advocacy • NBRC clinicians have met with Kaiser and Sutter Hospital pediatricians. 2 family resource center agencies/parent support groups, and county/foster family agencies to provide training on eligibility and general NBRC services to support and coordinate referral protocols • NBRC representatives participate on Solano, Napa, and Sonoma Community Advisory Committees, Napa P.H.O.N.E. Community Safety Committee, Napa and Sonoma Adult and Aging committees and Sonoma, Solano and Napa Mental Health groups to advocate on behalf of NBRC families and individuals receiving services to gain full access to these support systems
