CALL TO ORDER - Harry Matthews, President, called the meeting to order at 5:12 p.m. Roll was called and a quorum was present. Board and audience introduced themselves. Harry noted that the "Public Comment" portion of the agenda has a two minute limit per person. He encouraged those who signed up to appoint one person to present if feasible.

CONSIDERATION OF MINUTES

TREASURER'S REPORT

M/S/C (Huckins/Stern) Move that the Treasurer's Report for the period of August 1 - 31, 2015 be approved as submitted. **UNANIMOUS**

ANNOUNCEMENTS:

Micheline Justman noted the Annual Pumpkin Carving Fest fundraiser, hosted by Suzette Soviero. with all proceeds going to Friends of North Bay Regional Center, is scheduled for October 17th, 2015 at Dillon Beach from Noon to the "Witching Hour". Lunch and dinner served.

- Pamela Madden Krall noted NBRC's upcoming all-staff gathering at Sonoma Vets Center on October 22, 2015 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. At 1:00 p.m. NBRC will host a Vendor Faire.
- Sonoma County Mayors Best Practices on Employment of People with Disabilities will be hosted on October 28th. This year the Petaluma Pie Company will be honored as an employer who hires people with disabilities. There are currently four people with developmental disabilities who work at the Petaluma Pie Company.
- Aleana Carrean noted that SDC is hosting the play "Life's a Beach". Aleana invited all to attend as closing night is October 7th. She also noted that SDC's annual Halloween parade is scheduled for October 28 from 8:00 a.m. 12:00 pm.
- Kathleen Miller, noted that Hanna Boys Club is hosting the second follow-up meeting "Future of SDC" on October 17, at 9:00 a.m. The meeting will include a summary of input that was provided at a prior meeting including potential services at SDC.

NEW BUSINESS:

A. North Bay Regional Center Performance Plan Approval – Pamela Madden Krall. Every year NBRC is required to submit a Performance Plan to DDS. NBRC analyzes the data from the previous year regarding people receiving services and working in the community. At the September Board meeting, NBRC received input as to how to improve services and employment in NBRC's catchment area. NBRC also has a link/survey on the webpage where input was received. NBRC has incorporated feedback, i.e., employment first, community resources, employment, etc. into the Plan.

COMMITTEE REPORTS

- B. Vendor Advisory Committee (VAC) Mike Huckins

The VAC met on Tuesday, September 8, 2015. Linda introduced four new VAC Members: Holly from Connections for Life, Andrea from REI, Ali from New Leaf, and Kelley from PACE Solano. VAC now has a full complement of members.

Community Concerns/Clarifications:

- The Vendor Fair will be held Oct. 22nd at the Sonoma Vets from 1pm to 2pm. Vendors should get there around noon to set up. Vendors should delineate their services by County(ies) served, Adult or Children Services, and specific type of services.
- The Ari Neeman presentation is scheduled for 9/28 from 10:00 a.m. to Noon. He will discuss the new CMS rules. From 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. he will demonstrate his 'My Supports' software. Mr. Neeman is also providing a Self-Advocacy presentation on 9/29. VAC will determine how to assist in paying a part of his travel and other expenses.
- Maura introduced Seneca St. James and Hope Beale as new QA staff. She will meet with interested vendors after the VAC meeting regarding using TDS for work discovery. California's CMS plan still requires approval.

Group reports were given.

- The Napa Solano Vendor Group met and discussed R&D's organizational chart, uniform holidays, admission process timeframe, service coordinator changes, non-referral list, minimum wage changes, sick leave law, survey findings, and SIR review process.
- The Sonoma Vendor Group did not meet but will meet on 9/22 at NBI, 649 Martin Ave. Rohnert Park.
- SCDD North Bay: Bob Phillips reported on TransCen's progress on their customized employment grant with REI and PSI. An "Imagine Possibilities" workshop is planned on 9/30 at the Solano County Office of Education and in Sonoma County on 9/24.
- Trade Associations: Mike stated that respite organizations may have to create a new policy to avoid paying for travel time between two respite bookings as there is no funding slated for this.

Michelle Ramirez stated that CDSA is hoping to recruit more respite and transportation vendors. The Bonilla cocktail tax proposal was discussed. The Annual Meeting is 9/29 through 10/1. Linda reported out on the successful turnout of 1,500 people at the crest/capital rally on 9/3 but with little media resulting. Elizabeth thanked Linda for her huge part in putting this rally together.

- Board Report: Mike congratulated Jose Ayala for his participation in and winning two medals at the World Special Olympics. Mike handed out the NBRC Board retreat packet which included notes from Bob Baldo as well as economic footprint by County. He also handed out the Annual Performance Goal report from the Board meeting.
- Dr. Michi Gates: Michi noted that the National Core Indicators show that we need to improve on identifying employment goals in IPPs more frequently. She sent along Bob's congratulations to the new VAC members. She would like to work with the vendor community in improving the number of direct service professionals we have who speak Spanish or Tagolog. Due to the SDC closure plan, there will be a huge increase in the number of CPP and non-CPP Requests for Proposals going out this year. She updated VAC on what is happening with the Self-Determination efforts locally as well as the challenge of it being in compliance with the new CMS settings rules.
- Disaster Preparedness: Elizabeth stated that regional meetings need to occur.

New Business: There will be a vendor relations committee meeting following the VAC meeting.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Bob Hamilton, Executive Director, Report:

- Bob participated in a Conference call with ARCA's Housing Committee. The Committee is trying to provide permanent housing for people transitioning out of Sonoma Developmental Center (SDC) into the community. This endeavor is accomplished through NBRC's non-profit organizations. The Director of DDS, Santi Rogers, was on the call and encouraged the Committee to continue with this great work by knocking down barriers that keep NBRC from providing homes. All Regional Centers who have clients residing at SDC are in need of 90 homes to transition residents from SDC into the community. NBRC requires permanent financing from the State to make this a reality. We are working with Mark Stivers of the State Treasurers Office, who is in charge of the low income housing projects. He is willing to work with us on bond issues or assist with any other instrument needed to make this happen.
- Senate Bill 812 passed some years ago requiring each housing authority to include people with developmental disabilities in its Housing Plan. This is beginning to come to fruition. There have been people who have been asked by local authorities what the needs are. Recently low housing developers have approached North Bay Regional Center regarding building affordable housing. This is a ray of hope knowing there will be people "out there" in the general community helping with this issue. NBRC is currently working with Brilliant Corners and North Bay Housing Coalition who specializes in supported living housing. Discussion followed.

Michi Gates, Director, Client Services, Report:

- Michi noted the attendance of the NBRC Federal Revenue Department. Federal funding is very
 important to the Regional Center system. January Crane is the Department Manager of that program.
 The department also ensures that NBRC qualifies for Federal funding in order to continue services for
 people with developmental disabilities. Extensive monitoring is a must because the Federal
 Government requires written documentation. Michi thanked the team as they have allowed NBRC to
 perform above and beyond expectations by the Department.
- The Special Incident Reporting (SIRs) Team was also in attendance. Michi noted that this is an area
 that also requires extensive monitoring and training, both internally and externally. SIRs include any
 incidents of significance involving the health and safety of our clients. It requires NBRC, service
 coordinators, vendors, and community members to be alerted to what kind of risks present themselves

to our population and how to prevent them. Michi thanked the team for meeting requirements and ensuring the health and safety of our clients.

- As of Monday, January Crane will be NBRC's Liaison for the Self-Determination Advisory Committee.
 NBRC is collaborating with State Council on Developmental Disabilities as well as the Office of Clients
 Rights. The advisory committee is required to assist in facilitating the program of self-determination.
 We are currently in the initial stages of the advisory committee. Michi invited anyone interested in the
 Self-Determination program, to feel free to contact January for more information. There is an
 informational video on NBRC's and DDS's website.
- Ari Neeman, the founder and President of the Autism Self-Advocacy Network, recently spoke to NBRC
 and the vendor community regarding the CMS Study Rules. This information is vital for our services
 to continue, i.e., how to obtain federal funding by following the CMS rules, community integration,
 independence, the ability to continue making choices, etc. NBRC and the vendor community continue
 to collaborate with Ari on this project.
- NBRC continues to meet with Kathleen Miller and other parents/family members, or conservators of residents of SDC on a monthly basis regarding the closure. The meetings are very productive and provide an opportunity to talk and discuss possible resolutions. Next meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, October 13, 2014 from 2:00 – 3:00 p.m. At Kathleen Miller's request NBRC will provide a presentation on Supported Living Services.
- Michi thanked those who have submitted feedback regarding comprehensive assessments helping to make them as accurate as possible.
- NBRC has announced 34 Requests for Proposal for Community Placement Plan for SDC Closure.
 The RFPs have been posted on NBRC.net. NBRC will be interviewing prospective providers sometime in October 2015 February 2016.
- Kathleen Miller requested that NBRC provide a Self-Determination presentation. Kathleen also requested that a PHA parent be included on the RFP panel.

Dave Johnson, Chief Financial Officer, Report:

- All allocations from DDS indicate that NBRC is financially solvent with Purchase of Services funding.
 There is a shortfall in Operations.
- Annual audit will commence in two weeks.
- Union Bank now charges a fee to use a line of credit for \$25M (to cover two months of POS). They
 used to waive the fees for Regional Centers but no longer offer that option. The fee comes out of
 OPS. The bigger the line, the bigger the fee. For a \$25M line of credit is roughly \$50K per year. Eight
 nine percent of the money we receive from the Government goes to Purchase of Services and 11%
 goes to OPS. Sixty six percent of funding received comes from federal funding. Discussion followed.

LIAISON REPORTS

- A. Association of Regional Center Agencies (ARCA) Bob Hamilton (10 minutes):
 - Upcoming ARCA meeting is scheduled on October 15-16 in San Diego and will be dedicated to the ARCA Strategic Plan.
- B. State Council on Developmental Disabilities/North Bay Regional Office Bob Phillips (10 minutes):
 - Assembly Bill 564 (Parental Fee Program for minor children) passed in the Assembly and signed into law. There are just over 4000 children currently in out of home placement. The parents of those children who have an income more than Federal poverty level are required to pay a sliding scale fee. The passing of this bill began with an individual advocacy call to Area Board VI office several years ago.
 - Solano County Children's Nurturing Project and Solano Children's Network have organized a Day Care forum for November 5th and are inviting Regional Center staff, State Council staff, public officials, etc., to listen to the day care needs of parents and problem solve together.

- Self-Determination local advisory committee has a vacancy for one person. If anyone is interested
 contact January Crane or Bob Phillips. Self-determination focuses on individual needs of a client
 (based on the CDER and the IPP) from which client specific services are developed. Discussion
 followed.
- The State Council awarded a grant to TranSen (Worklink) to pilot some new ways of assisting
 people find employment. Consultation was provided on how to develop a new program model to
 ensure employment or volunteer opportunities. Bob requested an opportunity to present to the
 Board in the near future regarding this grant.

GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT: The following parents/family members of residents of Sonoma Developmental Center expressed concern and suggestions regarding the upcoming closure.

- Kathleen Miller, Parent and President, Parent Hospital Association: Kathleen suggested the following:
 - ✓ A health/dental care center remain on the grounds of SDC. Currently the Center has primary physicians uniquely qualified to care for people with developmental disabilities.
 - ✓ Currently there is a dental care clinic where clients receive yearly sedation/anesthesia dental care. This service would be much more economical than in a hospital setting.
 - √ Wheel chair adaptive services is needed to accommodate body changes as clients' age.
 - ✓ Kathleen would like to capture these services by developing a clinic at SDC. These services should be made available to people in the community.
 - ✓ DDS has suggested that a clinic won't be used/needed basing their opinion on Lanterman and Angews closure. No data has been collected by DDS to substantiate their opinion.
 - ✓ Kathleen requested NBRC Board to collaborate with SDC regarding housing a permanent medical/dental clinic using the expertise currently available. Kathleen noted that this is SDC's moment and help from the Regional Center is needed.
- Brian Boxall, family member, noted the following:
 - ✓ Brian served as the President of the Agnews Family Association, during the entirety of the closure.
 - ✓ The outpatient clinic at Agnews was initially supposed to be operational as long as DDS was
 responsible for the property. That turned out not to be the case as DDS chose not to continue the
 outpatient services even though they remained responsible for the property.
 - ✓ A dentist who remained for the outpatient services reported he was seeing folks in the community who had not had a dental visit in over a decade.
 - ✓ Lanterman property was turned over to Cal Poly Pomona so the outpatient ended when the last Lanterman mover left.
 - ✓ Because there was continued State employment at SDC, many of the valued clinicians of Agnews moved to SDC and Lanterman clinicians moved to Fairview. This is a great opportunity and most probably the last chance to capture their expertise. Discussion followed.
- Brian Farrell, family member, noted the following:
 - ✓ Pleased to hear about the Mayor's Recognition of Employers who are hiring people with disabilities. Roughly 30 years ago Brian's father initiated that program through a service of which the Mayor was a member. It is great example of those who care deeply about people with developmental disabilities are able to work together and accomplish great things.
 - ✓ Brian thanked NBRC for coordinating monthly meetings and sharing expertise with SDC families and for holding the October Board meeting at SDC so many could attend.
 - ✓ County of Sonoma has retained one of the best feasibility consultants for the creation of a new federally qualified health clinic at SDC to do an assessment of census and the need for services.
 - ✓ Brian's sister has resided at SDC since 1958 and didn't allow her primary care physician to conduct a standard annual examine for 15 years. During the 16th year, the physician was able to gain her trust and give her an annual exam which is very important in guaranteeing her wellbeing. The physicians at SDC have dedicated their lives to serving people with developmental disabilities. Obtaining medical and dental services outside SDC is/can be very challenging.

- ✓ Brian requested that the Regional Center Board join PHA in submitting a letter to DDS to improve. the quality of lives with developmental disabilities.
- ✓ Staff continuity is paramount. Making this work will not be easy but critical. Discussion followed.
- Father Tom Chesterman, parent, noted the following:
 - ✓ There are two Chaplains at SDC who are providing for the spiritual needs of residents. The Constitution of the Federal Government says that we should provide for the free exercise of religion for people with developmental disabilities.
 - ✓ Father Tom noted that his son is not a candidate to attend organized religious services at any Parish. He is non-verbal and has no ability to communicate. He takes someone by the hand and leads them to what he may want.
 - ✓ A Roman Catholic Chaplain has raised the possibility of developing a chaplain service at SDC. Father Tom's son can receive communion because the chaplain at SDC is sensitive to his needs. Father Tom noted that his son is entitled to this kind of provision.
 - ✓ Father Tom's son became very ill and because he was unable to communicate, it was difficult to provide the necessary medical treatment. The staff members were able to figure it out and make a referral to a physician. The concentration of the professional help at SDC are uniquely qualified to provide medical/dental assistance to people like Father Tom's son and needs to be retained.
- Jackie Sonaldino, family member, noted the following: Jackie's sister resides at SDC and requires extensive medical services. Jackie supports the concept of a medical/dental clinic being housed at SDC. Staffing continuity is a very big concern and is fearful that there is a large turnover of staff in care homes. Jackie inquired as to how much a direct care provider makes and what the average turnover employment is. Jackie requested a copy of a comprehensive report. Discussion followed.
- Denise Barber, family member, noted the following: Denise expressed concern regarding connecting with physicians in the community who are able to step in and care for people with developmental disabilities. She noted that physicians in the community she resides are very selective regarding prospective patients. Some physicians even interview prior to agreeing to take them. They are often times rejected. The expertise in treating people with developmental disabilities is of the utmost importance.
- Pat Walter, parent, noted the following: Pat's daughter, Andrea, was hospitalized for an entire month at the licensed acute care hospital on SDC grounds. During that month she was bounced back and forth from the SDC hospital and Sonoma Valley ER and ICU. The second time she went to the ER at Sonoma Valley Hospital, all beds were full along with all of Sonoma Valley Hospital beds. Other hospitals were being considered, i.e., Queen of the Valley, in Napa, Marin Hospital, etc. to transfer ER patients who required hospitalization since there were no beds locally. Community physicians who are the most familiar recognize that most physicians are not able to care for patients with developmental disabilities. Andrea required a ventilator (which is why she was sent to SVH ER). Physicians refused to transfer her to any of the other hospitals being considered. They would rather keep her at SDC without a ventilator than transfer her to a hospital where physicians were unfamiliar with her needs.
- Angel Giroux-Greber, parent (NBRC Board Member). Angel noted she has a six year old son who has severe autism. When she has inquired in the past as to who the pediatric specialist is under her son's health care coverage, she is constantly faced with "groans". With all the specialty staff at SDC, is there a possibility that it could be used as a training facility for private physicians/companies to receive the necessary training to provide needed services to people with developmental disabilities. Discussion followed.

North Bay Regional Center Finance Dashboard FY 2014/15








Service Coordinators: Inspiring Lives

As reported, voter registration is up in both the Santa Rosa and Napa offices and I want to thank the Service Coordinators for helping. Now, let's find a way to help the people we serve get to the polls.

Last month members of PHA were able to testify at your general October board meeting which is held annually at SDC. We very much appreciate the opportunity to speak with you and have you hear our concerns over the continuation of the quality health and dental services that our loved ones currently receive at SDC.

Currently PHA is working with others in the Sonoma Coalition and Sonoma County to explore placing a permanent health resource center at SDC that can capture the expert medical staff and services now only available to the SDC residents. This would most likely be a federally funded clinic and the services would be available to all regional center clients who could benefit from these services.

Naturally we are most concerned about the medically fragile and behaviorally challenging SDC residents as they are moved out of SDC, but we also look forward to extending those services who may be in need. The goal of extending the critical expert medical, dental, and behavioral health services beyond those who reside at SDC has been a long time focus of SDC and we are now closer than ever to making that goal a reality.

We would benefit in our efforts if you could add your important voice in support of these efforts. We respectfully request a letter of support from the Board for a health clinic for individuals with developmental disabilities on the SDC site.

Last month, we were fortunate to have two outstanding trainings by presenters who are known throughout the country for their work helping people to have better lives.

Ari Ne'eman talked about how services are changing, and Sara Murphy talked about a new service to help people get jobs that are a good fit for them and help them get more connected in their communities. Enrique Rodriguez presented with Sara to show how this new service can help people reach goals for work and in other areas of their lives.

Ari Ne'eman"Everything is
Changing: What's
Happening and How
Does it Affect Me?"

Ari Ne'eman is cofounder
of the Autistic Self Advocacy Network (ASAN),
a nationwide self advocacy



a nationwide self advocacy organization that works to improve policies that impact people who have disabilities. Ari was also appointed by President Obama to

serve on the Council on Disability, which advises the president, Congress, and federal agencies on issues that affect the 54 million Americans who have disabilities.

Ari presented at the Regional Self Advocacy meeting in Santa Rosa on Sept 29. He talked about new rules from the federal government that will help people have more choices and more control over their lives.

The new rules say services that you receive at home (not your family home but at group homes) and at programs must do these things to help you have more control over your life:

1. Help you be a part of your community How do you know if you are part of your community?

At home: Can you go to stores, restaurants, religious services, or out with family or friends when you want to? Do you know about activities in your community? Can you go to these activities if you want?

At your program: Do you have your own schedule based on what you want to do? Are your daily activities similar to what adults who do not have disabilities do?

2. <u>Give you choices and respect</u> your choices

At home: Were you given a choice of where to live? Were you given a choice of a roommate? Do you want to have a different roommate or not have a roommate at all?

At your program: Can you work or volunteer in your community?

3. Treat you with respect

At home: Can you close or lock your bedroom and bathroom door? Is your diet and medication information kept private?

At your program: Do staff keep your personal information private? Do you have a safe place to keep your personal belongings?

4. Give you the freedom to make your own daily choices

At home: Do you have to stick to a set schedule for waking, bathing, eating, exercising, activities? Can you have a meal at the time and place of your choosing?



At your program:

Do you have your own schedule for activities based on what you want to do? Are you with other people who you want to be with?

5. <u>Let you choose your services</u> and support staff

At home: Do you know how to ask for a new support staff or a new agency? Do you know how to ask for a new service? Are you listened to when you ask for new services or new staff?

At your program: Did you choose your program? Were you given choices of other programs and the chance to visit other programs if you wanted to? Can you do activities in the community as much as you want to?

Ari said these changes are to help you, "Get free from rules."

Sara Murphy & Enrique Rodriguez– "Imagine the Possibilities"

Sara Murphy works at
WorkLink/TransCen and is a national
expert on employment. Enrique
Rodriguez receives support from
WorkLink. He is an administrative
assistant at Diadexus and is a self
advocacy leader.

At Sara's and Enrique's presentation, "Imagine the Possibilities," they talked about a new service in the North Bay, where people get help to find good jobs and to get more connected with their communities. This new service is called 'braided services' or 'wraparound services'.

Braided services are custom designed for each person. No one's schedule looks the same. Each person's schedule is based on their skills and interests.

Braided services help people to:

- > find jobs that are right for them,
- > strengthen their work skills,
- > connect more to their community, &
- > address non-work needs.



Sara's agency, WorkLink, has been providing braided services for almost 20 years in San Francisco. She has been working with two agencies in the North Bay, Redwood Empire Industries (REI) and Products, Service & Industry (PSI) to get braided services started in the North Bay and helping job seekers go to work.

DISCOVERY

Sara says people should, "get the right job, not just any job." How do you know what the right job is for you? In a process called "discovery," you get the chance to try different types of work and different work environments. Sara also uses a document called a "Positive Personal Profile" or "PPP" to help people think about ideas and options for work.

Enrique Rodriguez presented with Sara. Enrique talked about the job he had that wasn't the right job for him, and how WorkLink helped him to figure out the kinds of jobs that would be right for him. Read Enrique's story on page 4.

Enrique: "Work has Changed My Life"

Enrique Rodriguez talked about the job he used to have at Safeway. It was hard for Enrique to do the customer service that was required in that job. Enrique said, "I don't like when customers tell me negative things." Enrique ended up losing his job at Safeway and he felt really bad about it.

Enrique went to Sara Murphy's agency, WorkLink, where he started the discovery process. Enrique and WorkLink did a Positive Personal Profile (PPP) to figure out how to support Enrique to succeed. Enrique's PPP is on the next page. Enrique's dreams were to get a job in a professional place, move into his own apartment, get a girlfriend, and travel to Hawaii. Enrique likes places that are quiet and professional, not loud and busy. He likes working on computers, he's familiar with office equipment, and he likes working on machines.

Enrique worked hard to build his skills and figure out what kind of job was right for him. He did internships at Kaiser where he worked in Human Resources (HR), family medicine, and environmental services (EVS). EVS was cleaning; he didn't like that. Enrique's favorite job at Kaiser was HR, where he did office work. By trying different jobs, Enrique and WorkLink found out that he loved working in an office with computers, fax machines, copiers, and doing filing. After his internship, Enrique continued to work on his computer and office skills while he and the WorkLink Job Developer looked for a good job. He took computer classes at City College and volunteered for Save the Redwoods, doing clerical jobs.

Enrique now works at Diadexus, a biotech company, as an office assistant where he scans, files, restocks supplies and office machines, and helps in the lab.

Enrique said, "I bought a computer with my first paycheck. I can now Facebook my friends any check my e-mails. I have lots of new friends and I'm learning lots of new things. I have money to do fun things, like go to dinner and movies with my girlfriend. I help my mother with bills. I am saving to get my own apartment and take a vacation."

Safeway didn't work out for Enrique because it wasn't a good match for him. He was not a bad employee and it wasn't a bad job; it was not the right job for him. When Enrique got help to figure out what he likes, what he's good at, and what he doesn't like, he was able to get a job he loves where he can succeed.
