Register or update your current registration online at RegisterToVote.ca.gov.

**Note:** If you do not have a signature on file with the Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV), you will need to print, sign, and mail the application.

## **VOLUNTEER CLOSE-UP Rosario (Nina) Palomares**

I was born in Manila, Philippines. My parents were poor but they worked hard to send me and my three siblings to college.

Growing up was fun. Our parents instilled in us love of God, family and neighbors. They taught us the value of patience and perseverance in life, trained us to be polite, honest and frugal.

Most of all, they wanted us to go to school, and to college to prepare us for a better future.

I chose to become a teacher, as teaching is a noble profession. My mother was a teacher and I wanted to be like her. So, after graduation, I passed the teachers examination and got my eligibility certificate. I became a high school teacher in the public school just like my Mom. I even met my future husband in school where we were both assigned to teach. After five years of teaching, we got married and had three children.

In 1994, we migrated to the United States for a better future for our children. Upon arrival, we applied for work and landed different jobs. The youngest was just entering high school but also got a job. The elder went to college and worked a part-time job. My husband and I were hired to the jobs we applied for. I got a job at a nursing home as an activity assistant. I learned how to play the ukulele at the same time sing American folk and traditional songs. Eventually, I was playing for the elderly clients for their entertainment, relaxation and enjoyment. I did the same thing at two other facilities which cared for the developmentally disabled. Sadly my husband passed away and I continue working now at United for Cerebral Palsy as a Senior Companion as well as an entertainer through **Zoom** every Monday during the COVID-19 days for our clients to view in their homes. I am happy to be able to help the clients avoid boredom while at home during this pandemic. UCP conducts classes for them five days a week to participate in singing,

cooking, memory games, gardening, meditation, story telling and art.

After COVID-19, I look forward to visiting my aging sister and my son and family in the Philippines. I have two grandkids waiting for me. I will kiss and hug them without being leery of the Virus.

One of this month's picks in the New Your Times Book Review: Beijing Payback is a first time novel by Victor Li who is devastated by his father's murder, and shocked by a confessional letter he finds among his father's things. Victor travels to Beijing, where he navigates his father's secret criminal life, confronting decadesold grudges, violent spats, and a shocking new enterprise that the organization wants to undertake. Standing up against it is likely what got his father killed, but Victor remains undeterred. He enlists his growing network of allies and friends to finish what his father started, no matter the costs.
