Creating Behavioral Educational Moments (CBEM) has been providing crisis intervention services to NBRC clients since 2012. They provide an intensive short-term support system, geared towards achieving stability for those at risk of losing placement, being hospitalized for long periods of time, and/or other unforeseen circumstances. CBEM typically serves an individual for 3 to 6 months, but will not end services until stability is achieved. They provide emergency on-call services after hours to assist individuals in crisis 24 hours a day 7 days a week for any NBRC in need. NBRC can call CBEM 24 hours a day for assistance in serving any client in crisis.

A **Specialized Residential Facility (SRF)** is licensed by California Social Services, Department of Community Care Licensing and vendored by North Bay Regional Center to serve individuals with medical and/or behavioral needs. This home will serve 4 adults in Solano County. The homes provide between 2 -3 staff to 4 client ratio during awake hours with a 2 staff to 4 client ratio overnight. Professional Consultation services may include: A Registered Nurse, Board Certified Behavior Analyst, Occupational Therapist, Registered Dietician, Recreational Therapist and/or Physical Therapist. These homes are monitored/visited on a quarterly basis by each client's NBRC Service Coordinator, on an annual basis by Quality Assurance Staff and annually unannounced by Community Care Licensing.

This contract is to fund a portion of the acquisition and all of the renovation for a Children's Crisis Home, in Sonoma County. Community Crisis Homes are residential facilities that provide 24-hour non-medical care to adults and children with developmental disabilities in need of crisis intervention services, who would otherwise be at risk of placement in an institutionalized setting. The home will be modified to meet the needs of individuals in the home, by hardening walls and windows, creating two living spaces to, developing an outdoor space that allows for privacy from neighbors and room to spread out. The home will have four (4) bedrooms with each individual having their own room. The residential provider for this project will be selected in the next fiscal year.

This contract is to fund a portion of the acquisition and all renovation costs, for an Enhanced Behavioral Supports Home in Sonoma County. This home will serve individuals who are moving out of Community Crisis Homes, locked settings, transitioning from children's EBSH Homes or deflecting individuals from locked or more restrictive settings. The home will need to have 4 bedrooms and will be "hardened" to prevent property destruction. This home will have a delayed egress feature to ensure the safety of the individuals in the home. *Per California Code, Health and Safety Code - HSC § 1267.75 "Delayed egress" device means a device that precludes the use of exits for a predetermined period of time. These devices shall not delay any resident's departure from the facility for longer than 30 seconds The residential provider for this home will be selected in the following fiscal year.*

Type of Request: \$1100 is requested for assistance with the family's rent and utilities.

Summary

JP is a 17-year-old male who is eligible for regional center services with a diagnosis of Epilepsy. Other diagnoses/medical conditions in his NBRC file include: Cerebral Palsy, Borderline Intellectual Functioning, Feeding Disorder, Constipation, Ileostomy, Gastrostomy, Gastro Esophageal Reflux Disease, and Migraine. He lives with his parents and siblings 3 sisters ages 2, 7, and 18; 2 brothers age 13; 1 stepbrother age 12 in their Vacaville home. JP's mother has requested financial assistance from NBRC for \$1100 to assist with rent/utilities as she reports that she is struggling with staying on top of these bills. She reports that JP's stepfather has been unable to work or care for JP due to liver, lung, and kidney damage from COVID-19 (contracted in December 2020). She reports that JP needs constant supervision due to his support needs, and he is unable to attend school (he receives some in-home instruction) due to his seizures and catheter.

The family income is based primarily on the funds they receive from social security and In-home support services (IHSS). The family also receives food stamps and they access local food banks and other charities to help them off-set their expenses. NBRC Service Coordinator has provided JP's mother with a list of potential community resources/programs for rent/financial assistance. In addition, NBRC is also working with North Bay Housing Coalition to see if they can assist the family with a more cost-effective option for housing.

TOTAL FUNDS REQUESTED: \$1100.00

ALTERNATIVE RESOURCES EXPLORED: JP's mother received assistance through Family Resource Center in January but they are only able to assist once per year. NBRC SC has provided a list of potential community resources for assistance.

Summary

SD is a 37- year- old unconserved male, who is eligible for North Bay Regional Center services, due to a diagnosis of Mild Intellectual Disability.

SD returned to California from Pennsylvania, upon his mother's passing, and was staying with a family friend. However, after some time SD began renting motels and Airbnbs due to the need to have a space of his own. SD is currently on the 811-housing list for Heritage Commons in Davis as SD is considered homeless and qualifies for this generic resource. However, SD expressed a desire to reside in Sacramento and he receives support from Synergy Supported Living Services. His support staff has assisted him with acquiring housing and located and applied for housing at Norden Terrace in Sacramento; Norden Terrance accepted his application and will be moving in on June 12. SD does receive SSI funds, but he does not have enough money to cover the pro-rated rent and deposit that is required. At this time, he is requesting board approval, to establish himself into the community and have a secure place to live.

Summary

TS is a 21-year-old male who found eligible for services approximately 1 year ago. He was diagnosed with Autism and resides in an RV that is parked in a lot located in Fairfield. He leases this location for \$816.89 a month and additionally must pay utilities in the amount of \$140.47.

TS was employed but has been unemployed since February of 2023. He has diligently pursued various job opportunities, including but not limited to Subway, Target, and Wal-Mart. Unfortunately, he has yet to secure employment. TS was also the recipient of a settlement (reason unknown) that paid approximately \$1500.00 a month, however, this settlement has run out funds. In addition, while TS can and will apply for social security benefits, his history of working could impact his eligibility. As a result of these financial constraints, TS has gotten behind in his rent and has an outstanding bill in the amount of \$2153.48, inclusive of late fees.

TS is at risk to lose his housing if he is not able to bring his account into good standing. TS and the IPP team are aware and working towards other housing options as it is clear that he cannot sustain this housing option beyond that is being requested from the Board Opportunity Fund. In light of this situation, TS and his IPP team are asking for an additional month's rent and utilities which would bring the total request to \$3110.84
